was left open to give the area a more spacious look and feel.

From the outside, you may not notice much difference in the appearance of the warehouse because the new building looks similar to our second, smaller, warehouse that was constructed in 2008. Built in 1953, the original warehouse was reworked and doubled in size in 1972 to accommodate larger and more sophisticated bucket and digger trucks of the era. As we reviewed our Facility Improvement Plan, we took into account the size of our trucks today that had again outgrown this space. Raising the roof and widening the doors wouldn't have been possible without completely rebuilding the warehouse. Now a truck can be driven all the way through the bays without being unhooked from its equipment trailers. And, we added a wash bay to keep trucks clean which also helps the vehicles last longer and enhances safety. We added a heated floor and drains.

For many reasons related to lack of effective workspaces and an increasingly unhealthy physical working environment, we made the decision to forge ahead with our complete Facility Improvement Plan even as we faced COVID over a year ago. While the plan has been in the works for years, the timing worked to our advantage, coinciding with staff working remotely and making the commitment early, we locked in building material prices.

Now that the project is nearing completion, we want you to know that we made every effort to be conscientious and responsible with the dollars invested. Our top priority throughout has been to provide the best long-term efficient environment in order to continue serving you, our consumermembers, well. Stop in some time and you will see something old and something new!

times for Clarke Electric Cooperative, since many people are using electricity at the same time. In addition, it costs your co-op more to generate electricity when demand soars during peak periods – and the cost of your electricity also may rise. By simply using less electricity during peak periods, you can help save your co-op – and yourself – money. Here's how you can help during peak hours, which generally are on the hottest summer days between 4 p.m. and 9 p.m.:

- Shift household chores and activities away from peak periods.
- If you have air conditioning, turn the thermostat up when you are gone and at night. Cool only the rooms that you are using.
- Use the most energy-efficient appliances you have. Your microwave oven uses less energy than your stove.
- Look for the ENERGY STAR[®] label when buying new appliances.
- Be aware of your energy consumption, and try to get in the habit of using energy efficiently year-round.

Use the energy you need, but use it wisely! You'll help your co-op avoid building expensive new power plants – and that, in turn, will help keep your electric rates stable.


The CEC nominating committee will meet in June to select gualified director
